Federation Member – Shelley Campbell, Chief Executive, Wise Group



Shelley is the Chief Executive of the Wise Group, one of the largest providers of mental health and wellbeina services Aotearoa in New Zealand. Together, the Wise Group family of charitable organisations has a common purpose: to create fresh possibilities and services for the wellbeina of people, organisations and communities.

Previously CEO of the Waikato/Bay of Plenty Cancer Society and past Chief Executive at Waikato Primary Health, Shelley is a member of the New Zealand Order of Merit – health and disability, as well as an Honorary Captain of the Royal New Zealand Navy. A strong advocate for reducing health inequities, Shelley believes the most effective health systems are those that invest in and develop community and primary health care services and supports.

Hannah is the Policy and Advocacy Manager for the National Office of the Cancer Society/Te Kāhui Matepukupuku o Aotearoa. The Cancer Society has an important role to play in cancer prevention and is proud to have a played a part in the smokefree regulations. "Go well" this winter

Te Whatu Ora and Te Aka Whai Ora are currently advertising on a range of channels about how to stay well during the colder months.

The campaign focuses on 3 main messages to encourage healthy behaviours: staying home if sick and testing for COVID, wearing a mask in crowded spaces, and choosing the best healthcare options. World Smokefree Day 31 May 2023

A new quit smoking campaign was launched this World Smokefree Day on 31 May which supports the Smokefree Action Plan and the ambitious vision for a smokefree Aotearoa by 2025. While smoking rates have been decreasing across all population groups, modelling shows that without targeted support Māori and Pacific populations will not achieve the Smokefree 2025 goal.

As a behaviour change marketing campaign, Breakfree to Smokefree takes a provocative and disruptive approach to reach and impact the remaining pockets of smokers who have not yet been influenced to quit.

Pay boosts for GPs & Community Nurses

About 6,100 more GPs, community nurses and kaiāwhina will be eligible for pay rises of 8% on average to reduce pay disparities with nurses in hospitals, Minister of Health Dr Ayesha Verrall announced in May as follows: Pay boosts for GP & community nurses

Dr Ayesha Verrall said, "Nurses with the same skills and experiences should receive comparable pay, regardless of which part of the health system they work in.."

Localities Update

The National Localities team sat down with Lady Tureiti Moxon to discuss the health reforms and the establishment of localities, a key new feature of Aotearoa's reformed health care system. Lady Tureiti Moxon, a Māori leader and advocate, played a crucial role in these reforms, fighting for Māori health rights and involvement in policies. Her efforts, alongside many others, contributed to significant changes and ensured Māori voices are respected in the system.

The objective of localities is to enable local communities and whānau to influence the design, funding, and delivery of their local health care services. This will be done by creating a locality plan that determines hauora priorities for those communities and which influences how health dollars are spent in that area. Planning for palliative care services

In early May a palliative care webinar featured Heather McLeod who discussed findings from updated studies of historical deaths and projections of deaths to 2043 and 2073.

Heather is an actuary and academic whose work investigating palliative care data in Aotearoa for the Ministry of Health and Te Whatu Ora has informed policy and clinical directions since 2012.

The presentation included:

- The strategic challenges for palliative care
- The need for inpatient beds at the end of life
- Updated national trends for place of death
- How place of death varies with condition and the need for palliative care
- Māori and non-Māori differences and the impact of deaths at older ages
- New research on how place of death differs for urban and rural people
- A focus on regional trends and differences, with a tool to use for planning

These finding are essential for people who plan, fund, and provide palliative care services in Aotearoa.

Oral Health Promotion Initiative

The Oral Health Promotion Initiative provides free toothbrushes and fluoride toothpaste to preschool aged children and their whānau through providers including Well Child Tamariki Ora, kaupapa Māori and Pacific-led health, Whānau Āwhina Plunket, Family Start and Outreach Immunisation. Implemented in December 2021, over 700,000 products have to date been distributed to providers.

An independent evaluation of this initiative is currently underway to determine effectiveness of implementation and the impact to pre-schoolers and their whānau. The interim evaluation report was received in February 2023. The report indicates that:

- the free product is meeting a real need for whānau that struggle to meet living costs
- the initiative has been implemented well and the ordering system works well for providers
- providers use the free product to initiate conversations about good oral health and other aspects of health
- there is emerging evidence that giving product to the whole household supports a whole-of-whānau approach


